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7. Opportunities, challenges and actions for improved statewide water management

The draft NSW Water Strategy outlines seven strategic priorities for action, focused on meeting the core objectives based on the *NSW Water Management Act 2000*. These strategic priorities are:

- 1. Build community confidence and capacity through engagement, transparency and accountability
- 2. Recognise Aboriginal rights and values, and increase access to and ownership of water for cultural and economic purposes
- 3. Improve river, floodplain and aquifer ecosystem health, and system connectivity
- 4. Increase resilience to changes in water availability (variability and climate change)
- 5. Support economic growth and resilient industries within a capped system
- 6. Support resilient, prosperous and liveable cities and towns
- 7. Enable a future focused, capable and innovative water sector.

Under each priority the draft strategy identifies several opportunities and challenges, and a total of 41 proposed actions to improve water management across the state.

Do you have any comments on the seven strategic priorities identified?

The building of community confidence and capacity deals with the bigger pricture of waht is happening between competing users - environment and agriculture. Whereas the concerns at a town community level are not covered well. This is understandable given the small demand towns place on the overall system in inland NSW. However, the cost of not having secure domestic water supply is disproportionately high especially when water for domestic use and drinking needs to be carted into rural towns.

Are there any additional opportunities, risks and challenges that should be considered in the draft strategy?

The risk of rural town running out of water and ending up with water that is not of drinking quality due to depletion of local water supplies.





What actions should be prioritised for immediate implementation and how should they be implemented?

Uralla has commenced a community consultation on options for water security, being run by ZNET Uralla - a community group in partnership with UNSW and Uralla Shire Council, with funding from NSW Government IRCCC Grant. This project is about half way completed so we do not yet have a complete picture of how our community feels about options for water secutiry.

However, some points to note:

- there is enormous appetite for our community to engage on this issue as evidenced by the response to workshops, surveys and stakeholder interviews held to date a nuanced and insightful understanding of the pros and cons for many of the options including water recycling a strong concern for the environmental tradeoffs that may come about from different water security options
- a real local connection with where our water comes from and desire to have a "say" in future options

In a water constrained environment that climate change is exacerbating, working with communities on options (including water recycling) is pivotal to acceptance of new technologies and key to engendering support for local water authorities to implement the most sensible technological solutions.
